## **1 PURPOSE**

The purpose of this paper is to document the data model and object catalogue for the functions within the Police Service associated with Watch Schemes.

## **2 BACKGROUND**

Each watch scheme is an organisation independent of the police. Watch Administrators (police employees) are required to promote the introduction of new schemes and actively support the work of existing ones (by attending meetings, providing speakers, material etc).

A central part of their role is passing incident information to Watch Coordinators (Watch Scheme leaders) and receiving back (from Watch Coordinators) any information gleaned from watch members which is thought relevant to the police. Area Beat Officers are kept informed of watch scheme activity in their areas and encouraged to make contact.

Watch Schemes are normally small scale - confined to typically 10 - 20 residences in a street. The Watch Administrator tries to ensure that a scheme 'sits' within a police beat area rather than crossing beat boundaries. Commercial schemes are more loosely framed - Schools Watch, Pub Watch etc - may cover all interested premises in a small town, several villages or a part of a city.
